Requirements for passing the course:

1. At minimum attendance at 10 practices and 5 lectures.

Non-participation in practical lessons shall be <u>properly excused</u> with the teacher, who shall determine a substitute in the corresponding form. The student may replace the excused practical exercises within three weeks at most during the semester (UPJS FM Study rules, Internal regulation No. 3/2016, Art. 12,7). The proper declaration of non-participation has to be brought at the week followed after non-participation the practical lesson.

If the student comes later than 15 minutes after beginning the practical lesson he/she has to substitute it in another group or it will be considered as non-participation in practical lesson.

- 2. Successful completion of presentation on the selected topic (minimum 20 points).
- 3. Successful completion of the final test (minimum 31 points).
- 4. If the teaching takes place in a distance form, through the MS Teams application, we ask students to have an audio-visual connection, i.e. the opportunity to communicate with the teacher through speakers and camera.

Course assignment – Presentation (2 students)

Content

The assignment aims to learn how to search for, work with, and forward relevant information in the field of social medicine. Once you pick your topic, focus on an depth analysis of it and incorporate your own opinions and experience as well as what is already known about the subject. Study reports, statistical data, graphs, and your creative spin on the topic are welcome. Searching databases like EBSCO, Medline, PubMed, Google Scholar, or SCOPUS is encouraged. Avoid using presentations from other courses or older colleagues.

Formal aspects of PowerPoint presentation

PowerPoint presentation should consist of 10-15 slides (7-10 minutes) and the following structure is suggested:

1st slide – theme selected, name and surname of students 2nd slide – content (structure) of presentation 3rd slide ... elaboration of content Last slide – summary (conclusion)

Good graphic features of the presentation and way of presenting will be evaluated as well. (*Reason: In medical practice sharing information in a well-organized and not confusing manner is crucial*).

Information sources (references) should be quoted on each slide.

Themes for the presentation

1. What are the facilitators and barriers to healthcare professionals engaged in health promotion?

2. Do people in your country receive relevant preventive healthcare? How the preventive interventions be designed and delivered to be efficient in vulnerable groups? Provide good practice examples.

3. Based on practical examples, present approaches in the communication of medical professionals with a patient who believes in charlatans, esotery, and medical hoaxes.

4. Role of psycho-hygiene and social support in burn-out prevention among medical professionals.

5. Perception of death and disease in high-income countries. Based on practical examples, present how end-of-life care for patients and their families in the terminal stage of the disease is provided in your country.

6. How to promote patients' self-management and treatment adherence in Doctor Google's era. Related barriers and facilitators of the doctor-patient relationship.

7. Specifics of communication in the relationship doctor - victim of domestic violence. Provide examples, of how to offer effective intervention and support to male/female adult or elderly survivors of domestic abuse.

8. Specifics of communication in the relationship doctor - victim of domestic violence. Provide examples, of how to offer effective intervention and support to child survivors of domestic abuse.

9. Social support and social participation. A look into the blue zones and how community engagement can impact one's health.

10. Nutrition and physical activity. A look into the blue zones.

11. Instagram is supposed to be friendly. So why is it making people so miserable? Critically assess the impact of Instagram, Facebook, TikTok, and other social media on health.

12. How to approach patients with minority backgrounds: Individual challenges experienced by healthcare professionals.

13. How to manage resistance to vaccination in the healthcare settings – provide examples of effective campaigns and approaches at the individual level.

14. Provide bad or dangerous examples of advertising in media and social media about healthy lifestyles and healthrelated behaviour and its potential impact on public health.

15. I want to feel good now! The public and the prescription-abuse epidemic. Painkillers, opioids, and hypnotics. Can we avert a public health disaster?

16. Overcoming barriers in healthcare: patients with intellectual disabilities.

17. Living in the Dark: Overcoming barriers in healthcare: patients with visual impairments.

18. Living in the Silence: Overcoming barriers in healthcare: patients with hearing impairments.

19. Home or facility - Which place is better for living when people age in your country?
