Aims

This course has been designed to provide students with a general introduction to the study of film history and theory.

The main focus of the course is to present historical perspective on the complex film art by studying its technological birth and stages of its evolution. The course also provides a basic intorduction to film codes and film syntax. This is important for understanding how technological inventions affected new styles of narrative and how a cultural changes (and other factors) motivated film artists to find a new ways of expression.

Contents

Students will be familiar with the basic language of film analysis and composition such as an editing, montage, mise-en-scene, lighting etc. Another goal of the course is for students to produce their own film analysis.
