Aims			
<p>The The main purpose and goal of the civil procedural law subject provided by civil law department is defined by the character of the Erasmus program and student's mobility goals.</p> <p>The main focus of the students' ongoing (mainly) written outputs is therefore the analytic comparison of selected national procedural regulations with the procedural regulations of the European Union, the research of the transnational forms of cooperation in civil and commercial court cases (proceedings) in accordance with the basic EU regulations.</p> <p>In that manner, students have to research with the basic elements of the judicial system of the Slovak Republic, its procedural part and procedural regulations - civil litigation (dispute), non-litigation (non dispute) proceedings and administrative court proceedings as well as the alternative dispute resolution in all accessible forms in Slovak republic.</p> <p>The knowledge obtained in that manner must be via next research level compared with the (selected) national order according to the choosing by the guarantor of the subject, or with international procedural law contexts in the above-mentioned EU scope or in connection to state of origin of the Erasmus students.</p> <p>Therefore, the main goal of the subject civil procedural law is not only civil procedural law under the conditions of the Slovak Republic, but in according to all international procedural law contexts and contacts of Slovak procedural law with the accessible international procedural law structures.</p>
